### YOUR TOWN - THE RED TEAM STORY

What is it like to go through the YOUR TOWN experience? WARC's Senior Planner Pamela Trammell gives a look at one team's journey.

"All 75+ attendees were assigned to teams. I was a member of the RED Team. We were from all backgrounds and different personalities (just like a town council). We were given the Town's history, demographics, town map, and a thorough overall summary. Team RED began by naming our town: 'Riverbend.' Our goal: to overcome barriers that prevented 'Riverbend' from growing community and economic development.


Many hours were spent, working past 10 PM both nights, to develop Riverbend. There was not always consensus. Discussions were had; compromises were found. Teamwork was crucial. It was hard work.










## BETTER PANDEMIC RECOVERY AND RESILIENCY PLAN

### **General RLF Guidelines**

- Businesses must be located in Bibb, Fayette, Greene, Hale, Lamar, Pickens, or Tuscaloosa counties. Projects relocating from within the region are
- Borrower must create (or retain) jobs: Goal of one job per each \$10,000
- The RLF can fund up to 35% of the total
- Businesses must provide at least 10% of
- Loans available from \$10,000 to \$250,000.
- Fixed Interest rate
- Flexible terms: fixed assets up to 10 No penalty for early repayment.
- Principals and businesses must be credit-worthy and generate sufficient
- Principals of the business must provide
- Borrower is responsible for customary
- Borrower must pay a one-time non-refundable application fee

### **Commercial Lender Participation**

The RLF was not established to compete with the private lending resort. The fund was set up to provide gap financing between a borrower's equity and a loan from a commercia

### Interest Rates

Rates on WARC's loan fund will generally be below the prime rate. By combining WARC and bank financing. the borrower can usually have ar

### **Local Controls**

WARC's RLF is controlled by a local Loan Review Committee. committee is made up representatives in all seven counties in the West Alabama Region, All funding decisions are made by the committee This provides for a faster response time to loan requests. Normally, loans will be processed within one month of the submission of a completed application

### **NEW LOOK for RLF Brochure; Covid relief loans assist** small businesses

- To aid local business during the pandemic WARC developed a special C-19 Covid Relief Loan Program.
- A total of 13 loans were approved totaling \$215,000 to support 8 new jobs and retain 69 jobs.
- A total of 5 minority, and 5 women-owned businesses were assisted by the loan program.



The **BE WELL West AL Healthcare Locator** map allows residents in West Alabama to search a variety of local healthcare services using an interactive online mapping application developed with ESRI ArcGIS software. The categories include Hospitals; Health Clinics; Covid Test Sites; Covid Vaccination Sites; Senior Centers; Dialysis Clinics; Substance Use Treatment; Mental Health Care; and Dental, Hearing and Vision. Symbology for each category appears at site locations on the map and can be opened to show the site address, phone number, website address and other important notes.
