BETTER Committed Leadership

Thirty-five local leaders representing the seven-county West Alabama region of Bibb, Fayette, Greene, Hale, Lamar, Pickens and Tuscaloosa counties attended the regional leadership training program sponsored by the West Alabama Regional Commission in partnership

with The University of Alabama Center for Economic Development. The training was carried out over four days during July and August 2021 at Hotel Indigo in Tuscaloosa. Participants enjoyed presentations on a variety of topics including professional development, building community capacity, financing and managing projects, creating resiliency and maximizing assets in their communities. Course materials and reference guides were provided to further support each participant's ability to carry out more effective community and economic development practices.




